## Vaccine Schedule for Your Cat

We make the following recommendations for maximal protection against certain serious infectious diseases that could affect your pet. New vaccines are now available and the age of the cat makes each series an individual one.

Feline Viral Rhinotracheitis	. A viral disease of the eyes, nose, and throat (cat flu, upper respiratory

Calicivirus	A viral disease of the eyes, nose, and throat (cat flu, upper respiratory

Panleukopenia (Distemper)	. A viral disease of the blood and intestines (cat fever, infections enteritis).

## Parasite Alert

Internal parasite tests are recommended for all kittens, pets with diarrhea, and at yearly examinations. Please bring a fresh specimen of your pet's stool (feces) for this important test. Remember, most parasites are not visible to the naked eye and only a microscopic exam will reveal the presence of the eggs or larvae.

PREPAID FECAL PROGRAM

Give worming medicine by mouth today and repeat every 2 weeks until gone. Drop off fresh stool sample 3 weeks after the last dose.
